Photographs of Harbor Springs in the early 1880's depict a very different view from what we see today as we drive toward downtown from the East Hill. Then, Main Street was a ragged muddy road lined with wood framed houses surrounded by fences to keep wondering livestock out of yards and gardens. An occasional boardwalk can be seen which made walking into town possible. What is missing in these early photographs is the structure that we today call historic City Hall.

At that time, Harbor Springs was the seat of Emmet County and a building was needed to house the circuit

court and county administrative offices. On November 28, 1885, an agreement between the Village of Harbor Springs and local contractor Mr. Charles W. Caskey was signed to "furnish the materials for and make, erect, build and finish in a good, substantial and workmanlike manner, a village hall..." The contract stipulated that the building be completed by April 15, 1886 for the sum \$4,000. Mortimer L. Smith, a Detroit architect, was hired to design the building.

By all accounts, this building must have been quite grand for the small village of Harbor Springs. It housed the county offices only briefly, however, and intriguing stories remain about how and why the county seat moved to Petoskey. Also, unknown is the exact date (or even decade) when the frame building was covered with stucco.

What is known is that for over 115 years the building served a variety of functions including the city offices, police headquarters, opera house and recreation center. At one time, the fire department was located in an annex on the west side of the building where today we see one of the two vault extensions on the first floor. On the second floor, wooden voting booths, a painted shuffleboard court and play bills glued to the molding and old Monopoly cards found in the basement attest that the building was once a bustling community center.

In the early days of Harbor Springs, a yearly elected president presided over the village. In all, according to HSAHS trustee Ed Meyer, 51 presidents served the City beginning with Carlos Hampton, who was elected in 1881 with 73 out of 112 votes cast. In 1932 Allen C. Angell became the first mayor of the City of Harbor Springs and elections were now held every two years. In 2003 the City moved to a renovated building on Zoll Street, which was once the city's waterworks building.

At that time, HSAHS was looking for a building to house a future area history museum and discussions began to ensure that the original City Hall would re-

main a historical structure. In the fall of 2004, HSAHS signed a long term lease with the city and planning began to renovate and adapt the landmark building for reuse as a museum. As part of this effort, any information, photographs, documents and stories about the old City Hall would be greatly appreciated. With help from the community, this grand old building can once again be a center for the residents of Harbor Springs and provide a place where our area's history can live on for future generations.

Buttons are \$5.00 per person or \$10.00 for the whole family (up to five family members). Shay Days hours are Friday and Saturday, 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and Sunday, 12 noon to 6:00 p.m.

All activities start near "The

Hexagon", Ephraim Shay's house at 396 East Main Street in downtown Harbor Springs – rain or shine. Look for the green signs and join us the third weekend in July!

SHAY STUDENTS TOUR LIGHTHOUSE

Fourth grade students from Shay Elementary had a special experience in May thanks to the Harbor Point Lighthouse Committee and the Harbor Springs Area Historical Society. Sixty students and chaperones took a step back in time as they boarded Stafford's Trolley for guided tours of the Little Traverse Lighthouse on Harbor Point.

Students in Barb Austin's, Robin Kredell's and Jeff Joneson's classes toured the lighthouse and learned about the history of the lighthouse, including the first lighthouse keeper Elizabeth Whitney Williams. A special treat for the eager students was climbing the steep steps and seeing the Fresnel lens in the tower.

HSAHS volunteers who helped with the day were Jim Grogan, Irene Schimmel, Judy Meyer, Betrina Snively, Jan McDonald and Josie MacLean. Lighthouse Chair Sarah Cohen coordinated the event.

After their visit, the students wrote logs of their experience, just as keepers kept daily logs of lighthouse activities. Copies of the students' work will be on display at the Josephine Ford Park Reading Room this summer.
