## Experiencing Shay's Invention in Full Size

Another outstanding "Shay Days" event was organized in July by the volunteers of the Harbor Springs Area Historical Society. One aspect of "Shay Days" that I find particularly fascinating is the photographic and oral history that shows that our beautiful resort waterfront was not so long ago a gritty industrial site of saw mills, factories, machine shops, and ice houses. The story of Ephraim Shay is an important part of our local history, and deserves to be studied and understood relative to the impact his invention had on the economic development of Harbor Springs and the United States. His gear drive locomotive concept provided for the effective logging and mining operations in mountainous areas that were unreachable by conventional rod driven locomotives. His concept also spawned imitators such as the Climax and Heisler gear driven locomotives that were created to avoid his particular patent design features.



Those who are interested in learning more about the magnificent machines that Lima Locomotive Works manufactured based on the Shay patent should be aware that it is still possible to see and ride behind Shay locomotives. Experiencing this today allows you to taste the similar experiences of Harbor Springs' residents from over a century ago as they rode on "excursion" logging trains north out of the city on the Harbor Springs Railway, better known as the Hemlock Central.

The following locations have Shay locomotives that are available for regularly scheduled excursion rides:

I am a particular fan of the Cass Scenic Railroad for several reasons:

1. They have five operating Shay locomotive on their roster including the last and largest Shay ever built; one engine celebrated its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary last year. They also have one operating Heisler and a Climax that is undergoing a long-term restoration.
2. The town of Cass remains today, as it was when it was built as a "company" town at the turn of the century. The West Virginia State Park system owns the town and has made some of the old "company" housing available as tourist accommodations.
3. The Mountain State Railroad & Logging Historical Association ([www.msrlha.org](http://www.msrlha.org)) has recreated a representative logging camp at Whittaker part way up the mountain with camp cars, shanties and a very rare logging skidder. They have also created a visitor orientation exhibit that provides understanding of the town and its economic history that shows how the capabilities of the Shay locomotive made possible the logging in the area.

The trip up the mountain to either Spruce or Bald Knob is a great ride through beautiful scenery. You will see, hear and feel the Shay engine's capabilities as your trip takes you up the mountain grades and through the two switchbacks. The view from Bald Knob is spectacular. If you choose to go to Spruce, you can see the remnants and foundations of an old logging town that has disappeared, not unlike some towns here in Emmet County.

It might seem strange to suggest traveling to another town to better understand your local history. I will only suggest that after you have experienced Ephraim Shay's invention in its natural habitat, you will better understand Harbor Springs, its logging history, and the impact that one of our citizens had on the economic development of the United States.

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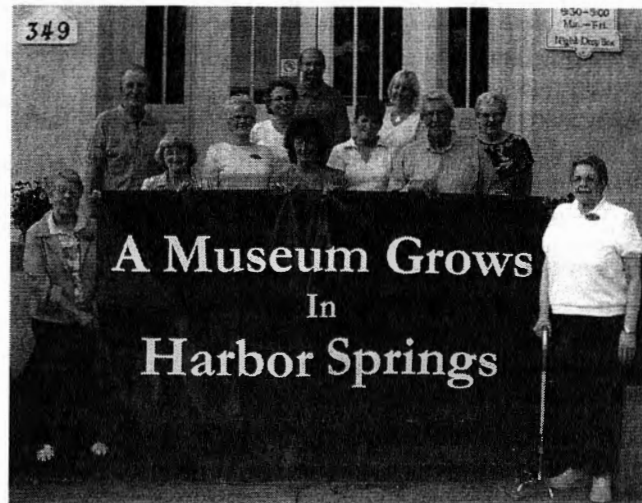
